AWL has come a long way in 60 years of service to the northern neck community. We started in a very small thrift shop in White Stone with an income of barely \$200 per month, which in 2025 would be enough

n 2022, we developed a five-year strategic plan, adopted a new, updated logo, and achieved Candid/ Guidestar Platinum status.





## 2023

n 2023, the Pawsome Reads! program was created and donated 412 humane education books to elementary schools. We also provided pet oxygen masks to volunteer fire departments throughout the Northern Neck.







## 2024

n 2024, we hosted a class on pet emergency care, Paws and Claws 911, and organized a free rabies vaccine clinic, providing 112 rabies vaccinations to dogs and cats.





#### SAVING LIVES, ONE ADOPTION AT A TIME

have been a volunteer with the Animal Welfare League for 30 years, and over that time, I've contributed to many different areas of the organization. For the past 20-plus years, I have dedicated my time and efforts to getting as many dogs and cats out of our local shelter in Lancaster County as possible, with the full cooperation of the Animal Control Officers who manage the shelter.

Unfortunately, there are not enough families looking to adopt locally, so the vast majority of these animals are sent to various rescue groups outside our area. This process involves a lot of time, planning, and expense.

I recently read a statement from a very respected animal rescue organization, which said that if everyone who bought a dog or cat instead adopted from a shelter, the shelters would be emptied. What a wonderful thought from someone who is heartbroken over the unnecessary deaths of so many wonderful animals. There are more dogs and cats than there is space for them in shelters across the country, and as a result, they are "put down" regularly.

Remember, when you adopt from a shelter, you are saving two lives: the one you adopted and the space you freed up for the next needy occupant.

#### REFRESHING OUR THRIFT STORE: A NEW CHAPTER OF **IMPROVEMENTS**

ver the past few years, we've hit the refresh button at our thrift store. It was time to tidy up, modernize, and address a few lingering issues.

Here's what we accomplished:

- · Reattached gutters where they had failed
- Installed a French drain between our main building and the smaller side building
- · Replaced overhead fluorescent lights with energyefficient LED lights
- Added a swinging door to separate our new retail renter from our storage room
- Installed "front door" light switches in the retail rental space
- Had clothing hanging space and large tub shelving built in our storage area
- Replaced dysfunctional window AC units in the main store with clear storm windows
- Replaced our front door and two large side windows
- Installed new heat/AC splits in our storage space
- · Filled a large hole in our sidewalk
- Installed two new pricing counters in our backroom
- Created a new sign at our back door



- Installed an outdoor spigot for cleaning donated crates and carriers
- Removed an unused kitchen sink and repaired damage to an outside wall

While these tasks may not be the most exciting part of our job, they are necessary to keep our store in top condition. These improvements were made possible by the income we generated from two apartments and four office spaces in our building. We hope these updates will make your next shopping experience even more enjoyable. 🗫

Alleviate Pet Hunger: Ensure that pets in need within the community have consistent access to nutritious food, reducing instances of pet hunger and malnutrition.




To Support Pet Owners in Crisis: Assist pet owners facing financial hardships by providing pet food, helping them keep and care for their pets.





#### A STORY OF RESCUE AND HOPE

f you look closely at the photograph, at first you will see a sweet Mama and her pups, (maybe of a Pitbull and Weimaraner mix), but if you look closer you will see on the sign behind them, the following words: "Wonderment, Allow enough time for the magic to work".

On Sunday, Feb 23rd at the Unitarian Universalists Fellowship in Whitestone, these beautiful, very hungry pups greeted us as we stepped outside...and little did we know, wonderment and magic were beginning to work their way into our lives.

The Mama was obviously seeking

attention and food for her pups. We wondered where they came from, how long they had gone without food and shelter, and how we could help them, ensuring they would get into the right hands.

We immediately went to work getting the dogs water and a few crackers we could scrounge

from the kitchen and dear Hanneke Shaafsma, offered the remains of the brie cheese she had brought for our after service gathering. I then contacted, a friend and fellow animal lover, Patty MacCargar, who I was to meet with that day. I explained what was going on and within minutes she showed up with kibble for the dogs. Unfortunately the pups had gotten spooked while people were emptying the fellowship, heading home, and had run into the woods, out of sight. Patty drove around the neighborhood looking to see if she could spot them. Several Angels stayed with the Mama Pup and me, keeping us company for almost two hours: Sharon Coulter, Lynn Langley and Don Keneflick.

I was given the name of Joyce Page\*, who I was told was a dog advocate and had kennels where the dogs might temporarily be placed. I called Joyce who told me that she would need time to get a kennel ready and suggested I contact the Sheriff's Office. As the sign suggested, I needed to allow time for the magic to work. I called the Sheriff's Office and they said they would send someone to us. Meanwhile, we got busy, comforting the Mama dog and looking for her pups.

Sharon Coulter managed to spot them and I brought the mama to their last sighting. Sure enough the pups came out of the woods to be with their Mama. Sharon had a brilliant idea and we decided to get them into the fenced-in play yard on the fellowship grounds. It took some sweet coaxing and a bit of push and pull, but we managed to get all three into the protected area. I phoned Patty to let her know that and headed back to Whitestone. the pups were back with Mama and

within minutes, once again she showed up with kibble for the pups. I encouraged my guardian Angels, Sharon, Lynn and Patty to go home and I would

keep them updated. Don decided to stay on with me. Another hour passed and I encouraged him to head home. I would be fine.

After numerous calls to the Sheriff's Office and being told that they were swamped with calls, I called Patty again, who lived nearby. We decided that we would call Joyce Page and ask if we could bring the dogs there. Thankfully, Joyce said, "yes".



of us carrying these three pups, one by one and getting them into Patty's car. The pups were easy, but it took both of us, one at the front end and one at the back end to get the Mama into the car. She was as docile as can be but a heavy load to say the least and we found ourselves laughing all the way! The pups seemed frightened and snuggled together in the corner of the backseat, while Mama seemed extremely comfortable during her car ride. We arrived at Joyce's and managed to get the dogs in their warm and clean kennel that would be their safe place for the night. With relief and continued concern for the pups, we bid farewell, thanked Joyce profusely

All in all, we spent 4 ½ hours trying to find food and safety for these pups. I returned home and had a call He was from the dog

pound and had apparently arrived at the Fellowship just minutes after Patty and I left. He explained that the dogs needed to go to the pound so that they could be checked for a chip and see a vet and to be held for several days to see if the owners were looking for them. I asked to be assured that they would not be euthanized. He \*Joyce Page is AWL's adoption officer assured me that they would not be, that he had already spoken to Joyce and that he would keep me apprised I wish you could have seen the two as to their welfare. He also gave me

his phone number and told me to call him directly next time. He said he did not get a call from the Sheriff's office until twenty minutes before he actually showed up at the Fellowship. I felt reassured by his kindness and he kept his promise. The next day he contacted me to let me know the three pups were picked up by their owners the following Monday at 12:45.

We want to believe this story has a happy ending, that they are in the loving care of people who were frantic to find them and will make sure they never are lost again. I find myself envisioning them snuggled on a sofa with their owners and being smothered in hugs and kisses. The truth is, I will never know what happened...

As the sign, reminded me - "it takes time for magic to work".... And it takes a village of caring people. I am grateful to be a part of a community that takes from another Angel the time to do everything in the story, Jamie. help animals in distress. the time to do everything they can to

#### AWL'S BOOK DONATIONS PROMOTE ANIMAL WELFARE AND COMPASSION IN NORTHERN NECK SCHOOLS

OVER 6,000 DOLLARS' WORTH OF BOOKS HELP SHAPE YOUNG MINDS ON THE IM-PORTANCE OF HUMANE PET CARE

In the fall of 2022, AWL launched a new project aimed at providing age-appropriate books to all elementary school classrooms in the Northern Neck. Each school received between 80 and 100 books for students in kindergarten through 5th grade. These engaging and often true stories teach students about humane care for animals and the responsibilities of pet ownership. The total value of AWL's donation exceeded \$6,000!

Recently, we followed up with the schools to see how the books have benefited the students. Martha Williams, Principal of Northumberland Elementary School, shared, "Books about animals are always our students' favorites. Teachers have incorporated them into lessons, especially those focused on kindness and compassion. Students have the opportunity to choose these books during center time and independent reading. We appreciate your support in providing a wider variety of books for our students."

Will Hernandez, Principal of Washington District Elementary,



recounted that their school librarian noted, "I have a set of these books in the library and have created a designated space for them with a plague. We have read many of them, and some are classics. The kids loved the titles."

CELEBRATING 60 YEARS OF SERVING THE DOGS AND CATS OF THE NORTHERN NECK COUNTIES: LANCASTER, NORTHUMBERLAND, WESTMORELAND, AND RICHMOND

I ow did we get here over the past 60 years? Through sheer determination to help the animals that cannot help themselves. And who made it possible? You did—alongside our wonderful volunteers.

From Irvington, VA to Main Street in Kilmarnock, to Irvington Road, and back again to 75 S. Main Street—our journey has come full circle.

60 Years of Service

Established in 1965 by four compassionate individuals who believed that spaying and neutering could reduce the overpopulation of unwanted animals and relieve suffering. With this mission in mind, various Spay/Neuter Programs were launched. In our first year, approximately 65 animals were spayed or neutered.

Today, thousands upon thousands have been sterilized—either free of charge through AWL





No one is ever turned away. AWL continues to cover the full cost of spay/neuter for any dog or cat adopted from any of the four county shelters we serve.

Our founders also dreamed of establishing a private shelter-or at the very least, purchasing a building for office space and a thrift shop. It took years of saving, hard work, and community support to make that dream a reality.

Thanks to generous donations (monetary and stock), grants, bequests, yard sales, thrift shop sales, and our beloved Dog Gone Dog Show, that dream came true.

With the help of a frugal treasurer, a substantial bequest, and years of careful saving, we purchased the building at 75 S. Main Street,



formerly the Marks and Sullivan buildingnow proudly the home of AWL.

In 2002, our shop sales totaled approximately \$4,200. By 2005, they had grown to \$39,000. Sixty years later, they exceed \$300,000, thanks to our incredibly generous supporters and over 50 hardworking, selfless volunteers.

We are proud of all we have accomplished and confident that the Animal Welfare League will continue its mission well into the future.

#### SUPPLEMENTAL CAT FOOD ASSISTANCE

A LIFELINE FOR STRAY CATS AND THEIR CAREGIVERS

Ahelp feed the growing population food. A receipt is required to receive of stray and feral cats in the Northern Neck. Kind-hearted individuals often begin feeding a stray cat or two, only to find themselves caring for a dozen or more before long.

When the number of cats becomes overwhelming, these compassionate Additionally, we always caregivers can struggle to afford the amount of food needed to sustain them daily. We frequently receive calls from residents asking for assistance with food costs, as they may otherwise be forced to stop feeding the cats altogether. We never want that to happen!

When someone reaches out for help, we ask how many cats they are feeding, how often, and how much financial assistance they need to continue. Together, the caller and an AWL volunteer determine an appropriate amount, and AWL provides a monthly trappers-reducing

a card the following month. The caller returns the receipt and the form letter from the previous month's mailing to the volunteer, and the process continues. We purchase the gift card from the business of their choice.
